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Possible Careers in Applied Behavior Analysis:

Counselors in public schools, colleges, hospitals, clinics or residential programs, and who work with children, adults, individuals with disabilities, low-income families and people struggling with addictive behaviors.

Psychological Assistants working with licensed psychologists in research, counseling or clinical tasks.

Special Education Behavioral Specialists working in public schools, private schools or residential facilities.

Board-Certified Independent Practitioners working with individuals to identify behaviors, create behavior plans, manage assertive and crisis behaviors and conduct individual assessments.

Clinical Behavior Analysts working closely with clinical social workers to provide behavioral management services, interventions and management in education, health care and social work sectors. Organizational Behavior Management (OBM) Specialists working as consultants or in human resources departments where they typically interact closely with management and decision-makers in the business to analyze and o en advice on improving employee performance and e ciency.

Behavioral Coaches working as consultants in sports and athletic programs to teach and reinforce skills used in training and competition. The principles of ABA are used to improve athlete training, enforce a healthy diet and regular exercise program, and to boost the performance of particular athletic skills, such as maintaining proper body form.

Animal Behavior Consultants and Trainers working with pets to improve the animal's behavior, and teaching owners how to maintain their pet's behavior over time.
